Psalm 22: 'Lord, Why Have You Forsaken Me?'

For the director of music. To the tune of "The Doe of the Morning." A psalm of David.

- ¹ My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from saving me, so far from my cries of anguish?
- ² My God, I cry out by day, but you do not answer, by night, but I find no rest.
- ³ Yet you are enthroned as the Holy One; you are the one Israel praises.
- ⁴ In you our ancestors put their trust; they trusted and you delivered them.
- ⁵ To you they cried out and were saved; in you they trusted and were not put to shame.
- ⁶ But I am a worm and not a man, scorned by everyone, despised by the people.
- ⁷ All who see me mock me; they hurl insults, shaking their heads.

Introduction

When we read the Bible, we must often remind ourselves that this is one book and God is the author. There are several threads of stories woven into this book, but they all come together around the person of Christ. He is God's answer to a rebellious and broken world.

In this psalm a number of verses stand out to us because it points to the crucifixion of Jesus Christ. Jesus quoted this Psalm when he cried in anguish 'My God, My God, why have you forsaken me' as he hung on the cross. We are all no strangers to suffering. In a broken world filled with suffering, many have struggled with the question 'where is God in the midst of suffering?' Some Christians would rather not pursue this line of questioning in fear of what the answers may reveal. Some would come to the conclusion that God has abandoned us because He is not present in our suffering. Psalm 22 does not evade this question, nor does it accept the conclusion that God has abandoned us. The psalm allows for two conflicting themes to flow through it. First, the experience of abandonment and despondency, and second, the certainty of God's goodness and presence.

The amazing thing here is as we read this Psalm and struggle through these questions, the psalm invites us to behold the cross, the place where we discover God's answer to a suffering world. God is not only present in our suffering; he has embraced our suffering. The cross becomes our source of strength, hope, comfort, and salvation because Jesus Christ who bore our suffering is exalted above all things. **'He has done it'**. Amen!

Structure

Psalm 22 is a lament. The Psalmist is a facing a very difficult situation. As much as he cries out to the Lord in anguish and speak of the many challenges that surrounds him, he continues to proclaim his confidence in the Lord. Observe how the Psalmist moves between the two strands of thought.

I will worship and declare your praises to all people

- 1. After moving back and forth, the psalmist arrives at a place of worship. The Lord is present before Him, and the Lord is faithful and true. This is a powerful declaration of the greatness and goodness of God.
- 2. The psalm's first line was a cry of anguish '¹ My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from saving me, so far from my cries of anguish? ² My God, I cry out by day, but you do not answer, by night, but I find no rest." Now the Psalmist with joy and confidence proclaims:
- a. God has not hidden his face from him but has listened to his cry for help.
- b. Those who seek the Lord will praise Him.
- c. All dominion belong to the Lord and all nations will come before Him.
- d. 'He has done it': A proclamation that will resonate throughout eternity.

Jesus Christ

1. 22:1— "My God, my God why have you forsaken me?"

Jesus bore our sin and was condemned for us. He endured the anguish of the separation from God so that we may have access.

2. 22:7— "7 All who see me mock me; they hurl insults, shaking their heads."

Jesus endured scorn and derision.

- ⁹ Those who passed by hurled insults at him, shaking their heads ⁴⁰ and saying, "You who are going to destroy the temple and build it in three days, save yourself! Come down from the cross, if you are the Son of God!" Matthew 27:39-40
- 3. <u>22:8</u>— "8" "He trusts in the Lord," they say, "let the Lord rescue him. Let him deliver him, since he delights in him."
- ⁴¹ In the same way the chief priests, the teachers of the law and the elders mocked him. ⁴² "He saved others," they said, "but he can't save himself! He's the king of Israel! Let him come down now from the cross, and we will believe in him. ⁴³ He trusts in God. Let God rescue him now if he wants him, for he said, 'I am the Son of God.'" ⁴⁴ In the same way the rebels who were crucified with him also heaped insults on him. Matthew 27:41-45
- 4. 22:18— "18 They divide my clothes among them and cast lots for my garment."

And they divided up his clothes by casting lots. ³⁵ The people stood watching, and the rulers even sneered at him. They said, "He saved others; let him save himself if he is God's Messiah, the Chosen One." ³⁶ The soldiers also came up and mocked him. They offered him wine vinegar ³⁷ and said, "If you are the king of the Jews, save yourself." Luke 23:34-37

- 5. **22:31b—** "he has done it."
- **'It is finished'**. Jesus has delivered us. In Him we have eternal life. As the psalmist proclaims that God has done it, we can proclaim the finished work of Christ.
- 6. <u>22:22</u>— "²² I will declare your name to my people; in the assembly I will praise you."

Hebrews 2:11-12

¹¹ Both the one who makes people holy and those who are made holy are of the same family. So Jesus is not ashamed to call them brothers and sisters. ¹² He says, "I will declare your name to my brothers and sisters; in the assembly I will sing your praises."

The book of Hebrews tells us that it is Jesus who will proclaim the goodness of God to his people (family, all nations) throughout the ages. Through his suffering and resurrection, Jesus will glorify God among all people. All people will know that God will not forsake those whose trust are in Him.

Prayer

² fixing our eyes on Jesus, the pioneer and perfecter of faith. For the joy set before him he endured the cross, scorning its shame, and sat down at the right hand of the throne of God. ³ Consider him who endured such opposition from simmers, so that you will not grow weary and lose heart. **Hebrews 12:2-3**
